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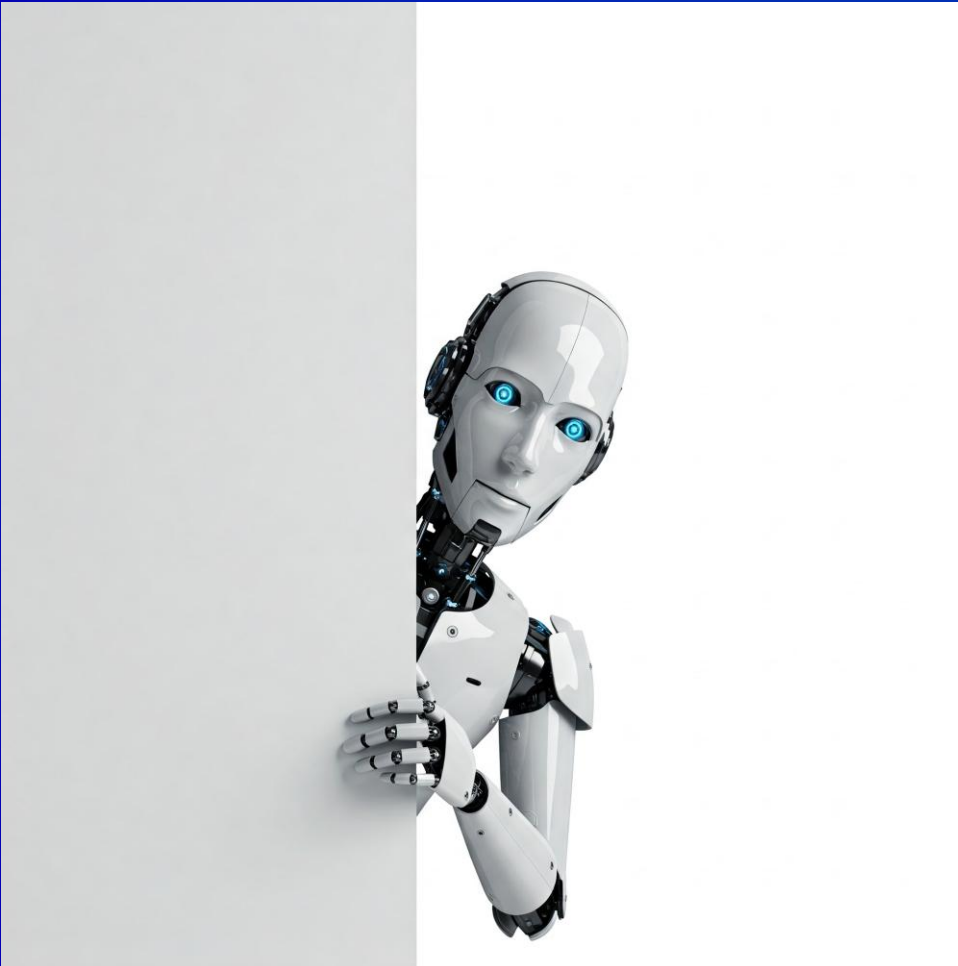

“Behind the scenes” AI

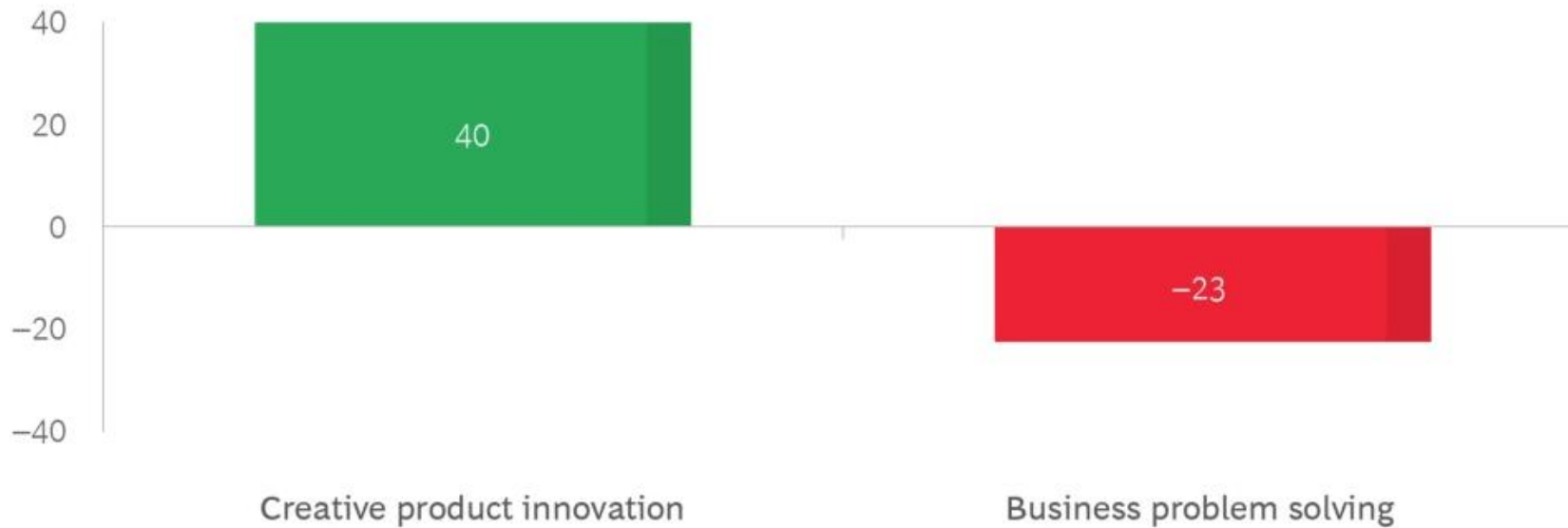


- Spell / grammar check
- Noise cancellation
 - Voice isolation
- Voice or facial recognition (speaker attribution)
- Background replacement
- Closed captions / real-time translation
- Video and audio enhancement (e.g. Webex AI Codec)
- Auto-framing, image touch up, background “cleaning”
- Multi-camera meeting rooms “AI director”

- You get no value if no one uses your AI Assistant
 - ROI requires adoption
 - This is why Microsoft is investing in creating adoption, training, and usage reporting tools
 - Zoom, Google, and Webex also have adoption and training materials for their AI Companions / Assistants
- You might get negative value if people use AI wrong

Exhibit 1 - Generative AI Significantly Boosts or Hurts Performance, Depending on the Type of Task

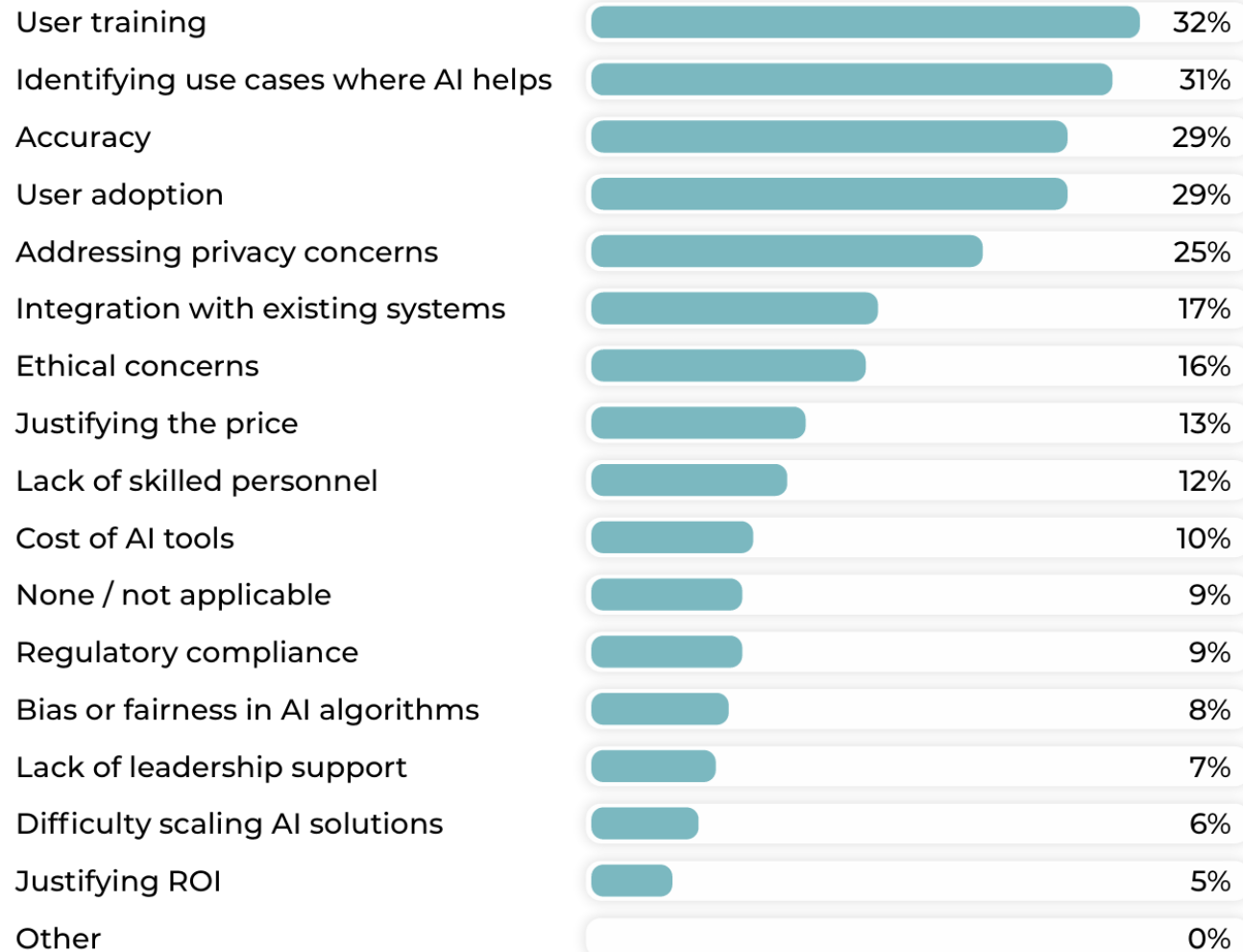
Difference in individual performance with GPT-4 compared with control group (%)

- Around 90% of participants improved their performance when using GenAI for creative ideation. People did best when they did not attempt to edit the output.
- On business problem solving, many participants took GenAI's misleading output at face value. Their performance was 23% worse than those who didn't use the tool at all.

“Work-grounded” vs “Web-grounded”

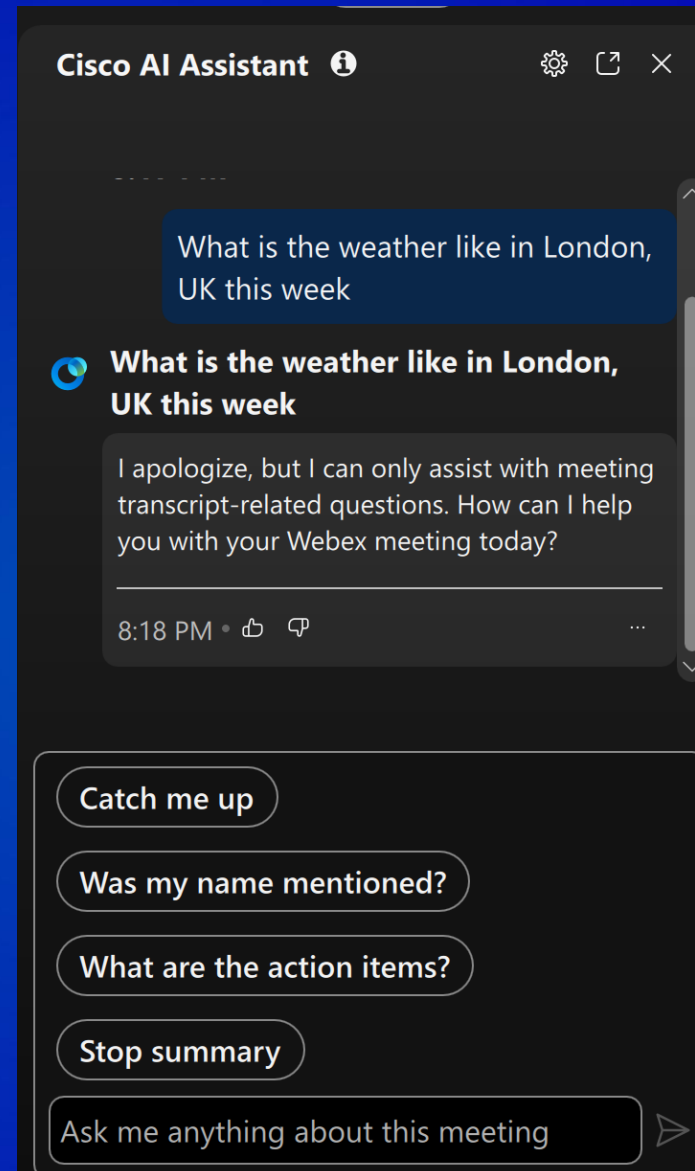
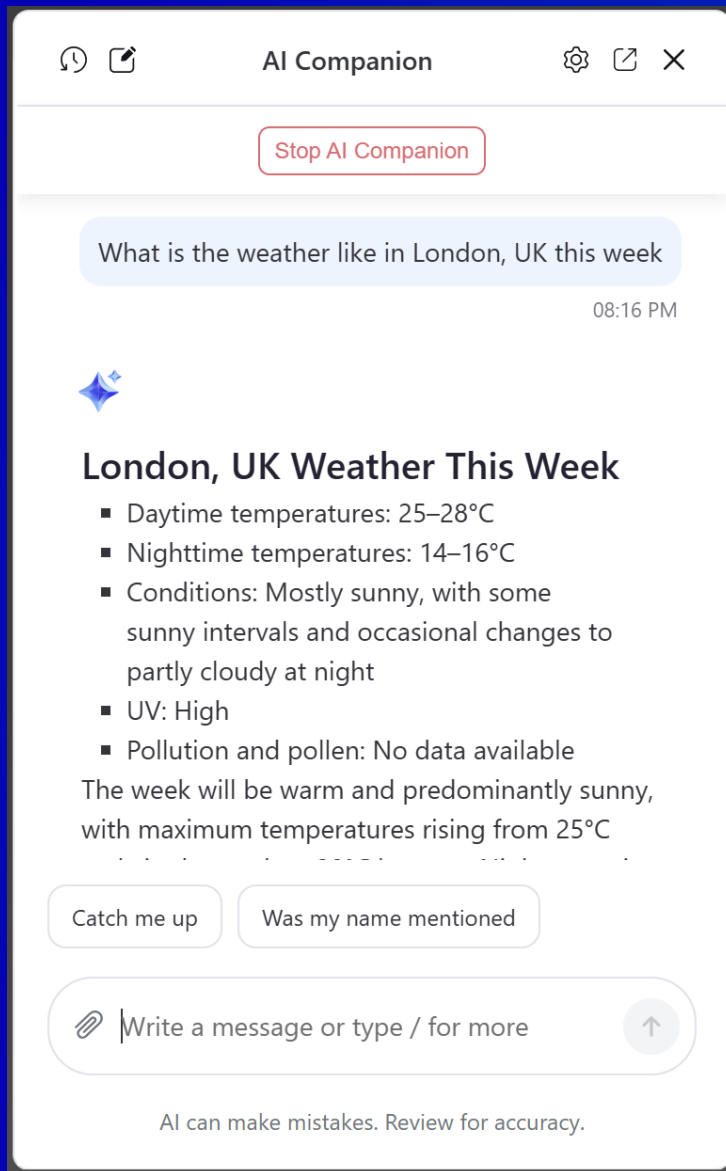
A **work-grounded** AI assistant has access to all relevant work information: meeting summaries, chat history, email, calendar, file repositories, contacts, and your interaction history.

A **web-grounded** AI assistant has access to general knowledge from the internet.

Ideally you want both.

- Many AI meeting tools are only work-grounded (or worse only can answer questions based on the transcript)
- Many stand-alone tools are only web-grounded.

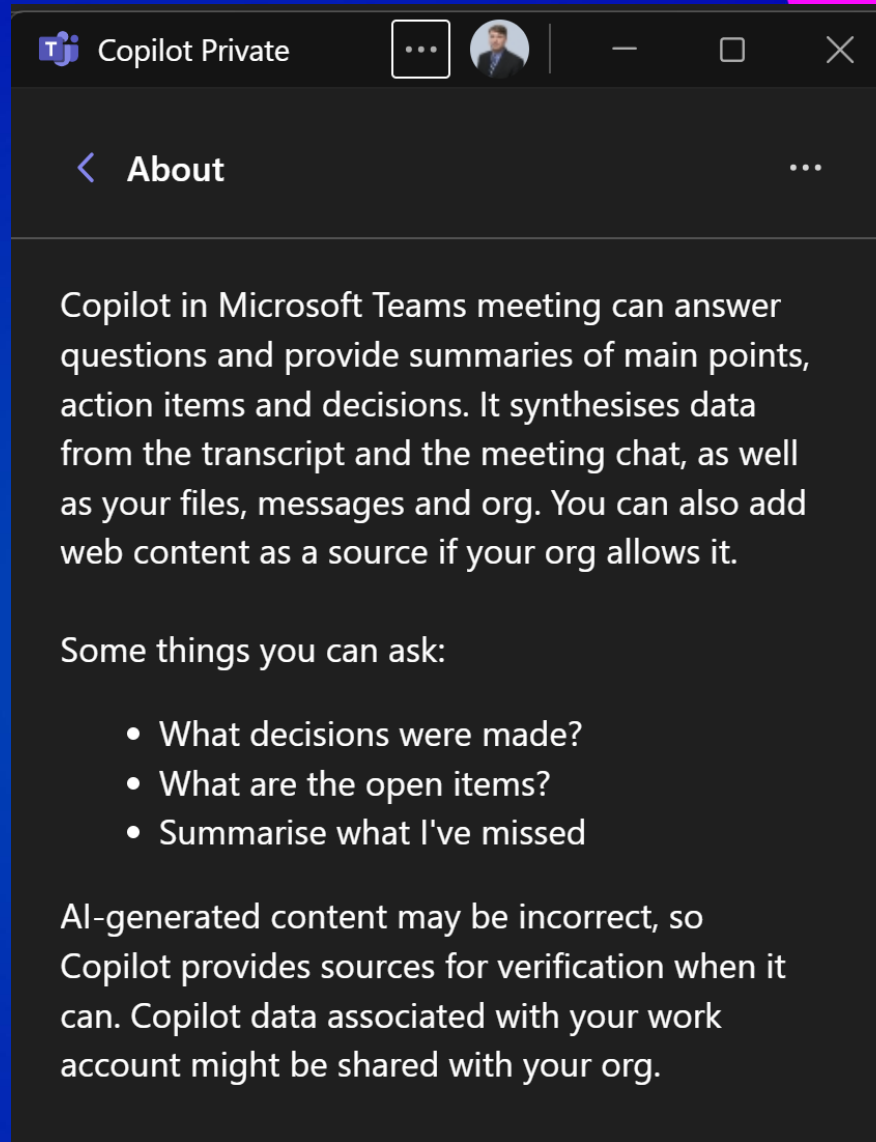
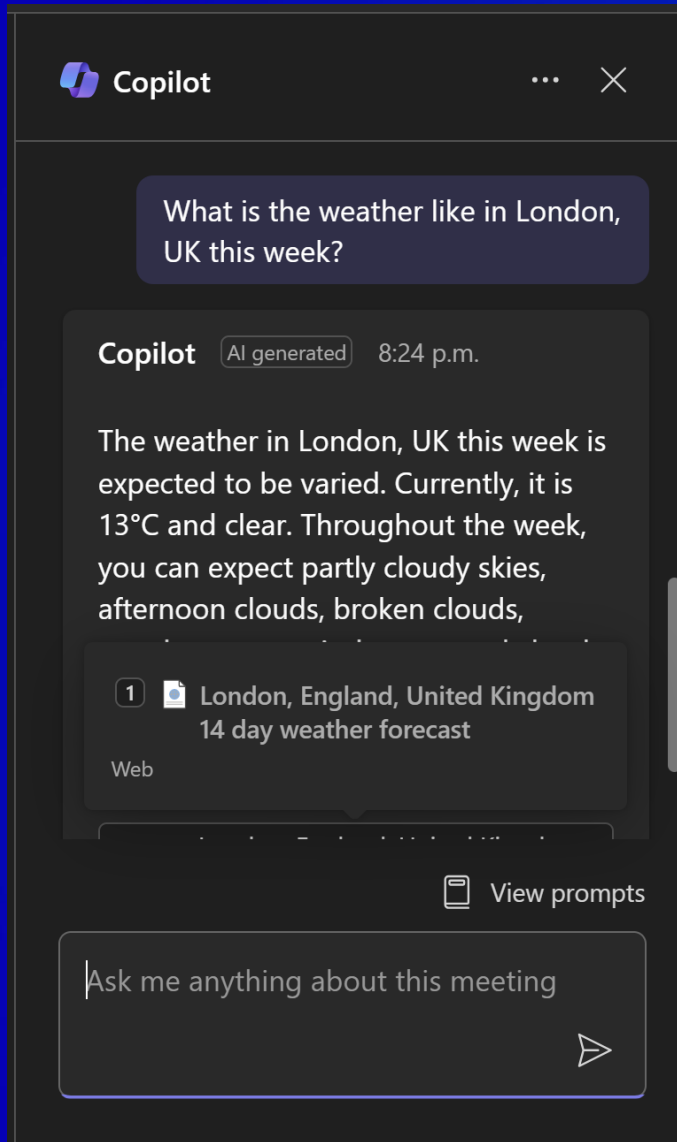

The specific ability for Copilot to access **web content and organizational files during meetings** began rolling out in **July 2025** ^[7], marking a key milestone where the AI can truly act as an all-knowing meeting aide, pulling in whatever information is needed on demand (with proper safeguards in place).

- **Mar 2023:** Initial Copilot announcement (preview in Teams with internal data) ^[1].

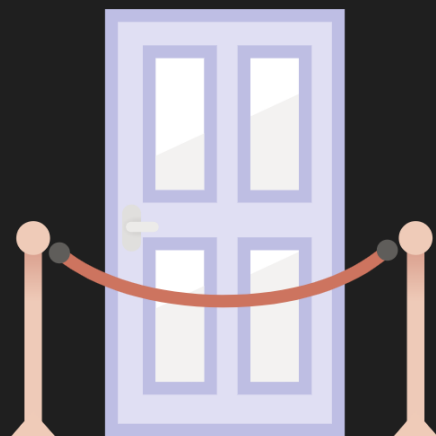

- **Who can start or stop note-taking?**

The meeting organizer and internal participants can start/stop notes. When host controls are enabled, only the meeting organizer, hosts and co-hosts can do so.

- **Who can view the “summary so far” during the meeting?**

All participants can see the “summary so far” regardless of whether host controls are enabled or not.

- **Who receives the email with the notes link?**

- **Who has access permission to the notes doc?**

The notes document has sharing permissions that provide access to the meeting organizer and internal invitees listed on the calendar event, regardless of whether host controls are enabled or not. Access permission is automatically applied only to individual people on the calendar event; invited groups aren't automatically granted access permission to the notes document.

- **Who can see the notes doc attached to the calendar event?**

The meeting organizer, internal invitees, and external guests can see that the calendar event contains an attachment with the meeting notes document. The ability to see the document attached to the calendar invite does not mean they have access to the document. The document sharing permissions described above is what determines whether they can access the document.



Meeting summaries

- Sending without reviewing is a bad idea
- Audio quality matters for transcriptions
- Speaker attribution is tricky
- Understanding what is included and what is excluded is important
- Not allowing editing of AI summaries is bad design

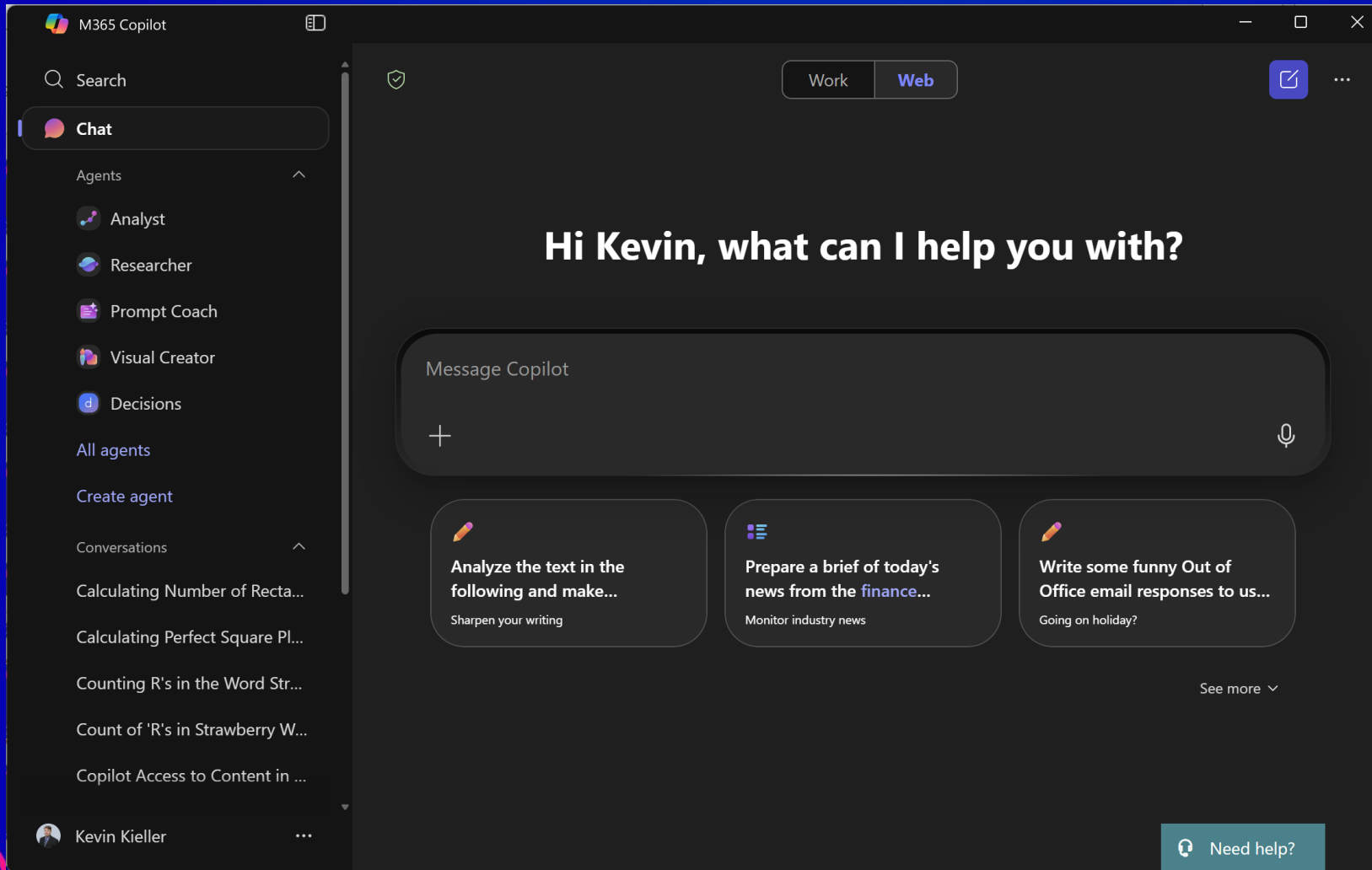
Concluding thoughts

What does it all mean?

Take aways

- AI will determine winners and losers
- End users are NOT getting enough training
- Access to your content and context is what makes AI Assistants truly valuable
- AI Agents will increasingly become the focus
 - data source prep and continuous testing methodology are still significant challenges to be overcome
 - Vendors with strong contact centres will likely incubate there
 - Today show better in demos than production
- Vendors will need to monetize AI
- Verticalized AI Assistants and Agents will succeed where horizontal solutions face tough competition

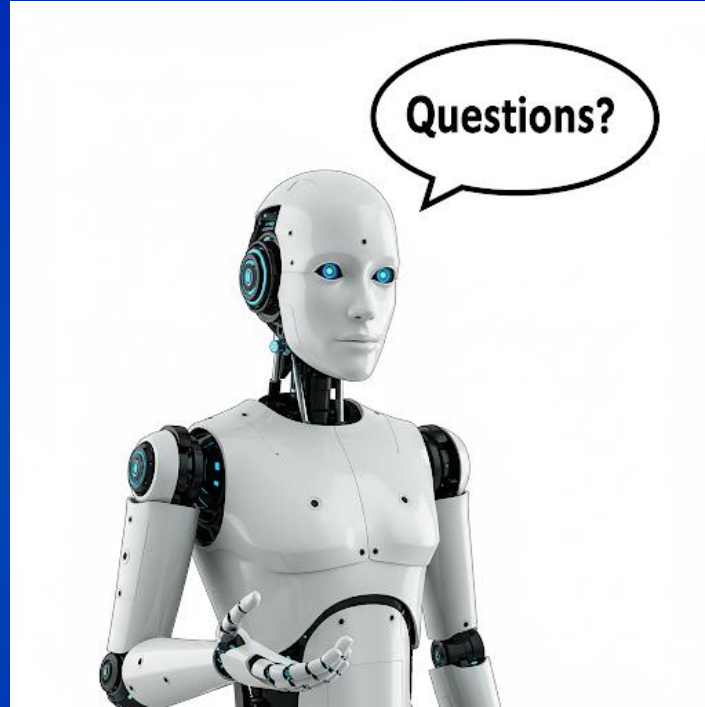
